

From gangs to grads

In May, four unlikely students walked across the stage to receive their high school diplomas. Each has been in trouble at home, at school and in the community. All have been kicked out of their neighborhood schools and had confrontations with Memphis police.

Enter into their lives the A-Team, a new MAM ministry initiative, headed by Detric Golden. The mission is to take students assigned to Northwest Prep Academy, a year-round alternative school, from gangs to grads.

"Northwest Prep is full of kids that most people would say are hopeless. With guidance, A-team members are now setting positive life goals and working towards those goals," said Detric. "You wouldn't believe that these kids have been kicked out of school. They are focused. They even love to talk about God."

Detric is at Northwest Prep every day using sports to connect with students. As a former Memphis Tiger basketball player who had the option to go to the NBA, Detric is cool to hang out with and uses his "coolness" to get students involved in academics, Bible studies and life skills training as members of the A-team.

Detric only allows 20 teens to be on the A-team at one time, so that he can better engage in disciple-making with each child. There are three A-team graduations per year; the traditional time in May, and in July and December. As students finish high school, they graduate from the A-Team, leaving openings for others to join.





Detric uses a ranking system similar to gang hierarchy to assign each team member a role. Ranks such as recruits, foot soldiers, enforcers, officers and lieutenants have different responsibilities. To join the A-team, a student has to be recommended by a current member. Officers and/or lieutenants talk with prospects and if approved, they are on probation, proving themselves by having respect for teachers, no truancy, not getting into trouble, etc.

"Probation can be a struggle for students, especially if they already are having trouble with authority figures," said Detric. "But, for many, this is the point where they begin to turn their lives around."

Every time I have been around Detric's A-team students, I am encouraged. I am encouraged by Terry, LaCavis, and by De'Xavior and Raheem. In spite of being hurt, angry, fearful and lonely, these four young men and 16 other teens are becoming positive influencers and leaders at Northwest Prep. And they are helping each other.

I believe that MAM's A-team program will empower these troubled teens to change the course of their lives. But the reality is that these kids are changing me. I am broken over the hurts and struggles these kids endure, but the joy they bring into my life outdoes the sadness. I have a richer Christ- centered life when I let these kids into my life; I help them, they help me and God helps all of us.

I am asking you the question: What will you do to help one child in our city? Will you give time, talent or treasure? I promise you will be forever changed if you ask God to help you serve these amazing kids. 
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
